*William Groom* alias *Connor*, and *Sarah*, his wife, were charged with feloniously stealing two silver half-pint mugs, six silver tea-spoons, and a pair of sheets, the property of *Mr. John Yale*, of *Jesus college*.—The constable stated, that in consequence of information he received, he went and searched the male prisoner in a public-house, at *Barwell*, and found upon him one of the mugs and the tea-spoons; he afterwards discovered the other mug in the possession of the female prisoner. The prosecutor deposed that the male prisoner went to his apartments in college, and begged for some assistance as a weaver out of employ, in consequence of which he relieved him. About a fortnight after the prisoner again entered the rooms of the prosecutor in an abrupt manner, and enquired for a gentleman of the name of *Wilson*, of which name there was no person residing in the college. This circumstance, together with the prisoner's having been seen by several other persons lurking about the college, excited suspicion, and on the discovery of the robbery he was apprehended.—The learned *Recorder* informed the jury that the female prisoner must be acquitted, as it appeared she had been acting under the influence and direction of her husband, who alone was responsible.—The man was found guilty, and sentenced to be transported seven years.
